Unwanted dog behaviors can always develop and will most likely get worse if not attended to. **Prevention is the best medicine.**

Rewarding your puppy for good behavior is an important aspect of training. The more often the dog is rewarded, the quicker he will learn. Therefore, it is essential that you set up situations repeatedly in order for the dog to get lots of practice at doing the right thing. It is equally important that you always praise your dog for good behavior instead of taking it for granted. It's easy to forget to praise good behavior because it goes unnoticed...but, the very nature of misbehavior gets your attention.

**Praise and reward often to maintain good behaviors.**

Training should be fun for you and your dog. It can enrich your relationship and make living together more enjoyable. A well trained dog is confident and can be allowed greater freedom than an untrained dog.
